

3. Dr. Randall Heather

Heather is a terrorism expert who was interviewed by Kevin Ogle of KFOR-TV in Oklahoma City on the morning of 19 April 1995, shortly after the bombing. During the interview, Heather made the following comments:

I know that there had been a threat called into the FBI last week. It's a great stroke of luck that we actually have got diffused bombs. It's through the bomb material that we will be able to track down who committed this atrocity.... Usually, when there is a bomb of this type,... sometimes they can get small pieces of the device and trace it back. It's my impression that we will have an entire actual diffused device. And that will be, for the FBI and the other investigative agencies, a tremendous help. It's a great leap forward in finding out who committed this act.

4. Toni Garrett

Garrett was a nurse who was working in the identification and tagging of bodies. She states that "Four people—rescue workers—told us there was a bomb in the building with a timing mechanism set to go off ten minutes after nine." Garret stated the she was told by witnesses that it was an active bomb and that they "saw the Bomb Squad take it away." 5. Dick Miller

Miller, an Oklahoma City Fire Marshal, confirmed Garrett's story. In speaking of the bomb, he stated that a box marked "High Explosives" "had a timer on it." According to author, David Hoffman, "The timing mechanism apparently had been set to detonate at ten minutes after nine. Apparently it had malfunctioned due to the initial blast." 6. Oklahoma City Police Officer

Hoffman also tells of a Police Officer who started to walk into the building when a fireman yelled, "Hey, idiot, that's a bomb!" The officer looked around and saw a box surrounded by police crime tape. The fireman yelled to him again, "There's one over there and another over there! We're waiting for the bomb squads to come back from hauling off the others." (Source: *The Oklahoma City Bombing and the Politics of Terror*, David Hoffman, Feral House, 1998, pg. 26)

7. Another Oklahoma City Police Officer

According to Hoffman, Investigator Phil O' Halloran contends that he has an Oklahoma City police officer on tape stating that "one of the bombs found in the building was two to three five-gallon containers of mercury fulminate—a powerful explosive—one not easily obtainable except to military sources."
